





Chester Zoo is the largest zoo in the UK and was closed on 21st March, following lockdown restrictions due to the Covid-19 outbreak. It reopened on 15th June after being closed for 3 months. During the long period it was closed, the owners were concerned that it may not ever have been able to reopen due to the huge lack of income caused by the closure and the huge costs involved in feeding the animals.

What is a proper noun?

Common nouns are the general names for people, places, objects or animals.

Proper nouns are different as they name specific places/landmarks or people/characters (e.g. Benji the dog). They should always start with a capital letter. Months of the year, days of the week, some events/festivals and brand/company names are also considered to be proper nouns.







What is Dharma?

Hinduism is a religion which has fused many different traditions and practices. There is no one way to be a Hindu, nevertheless, there are certain fundamental principles that all Hindus share.





In Hinduism, 'dharma' means duty, religion, virtue and morality; it is a central part of a Hindu's daily life. Hindus believe that there are right and wrong ways to behave so they must behave correctly, follow the moral law and take their duties seriously. According to dharma, it is best to do the right thing at all times.

Dharma Examples

For example, a pupil's dharma is to work hard at school; the parents' dharma is to raise and support their family; and the dharma of the police is to protect others. At different stages of a Hindu's life, their dharma will change, however, it is everyone's dharma to be kind, honest, religious and to be a good person in society.



Adharma



Hindus believe that following their dharma allows them to feel happy and live a rewarding life. Not acting in accordance with your dharma is believed to be wrong and called 'adharma'.

Dharma, Karma and Reincarnation

Karma refers to the law that every action has a reaction in the near or distant future. Therefore, actions in accordance with dharma will have good reactions.

If a Hindu follows the dharma, they can expect to be reincarnated into a higher form in the next life or good luck will come their way.

Reincarnation

Hindus believe that all living things have a soul (atma) which cannot be destroyed. Instead, Hindus believe in reincarnation, which means that the soul exists inside the body until the living thing dies. It then enters a new living thing.


Karma, good and bad actions carried out during someone's life, affects which living thing the soul will be born into next. For example, Hindus think it is possible for a human soul to be reborn as a cat.

Ways to Pay				
Ways to Pay	Description			
Credit Card	A card that you can use to spend money 'on credit'. This means money that you are being lent but is not yours. You can spend money on a credit card but then pay back the company that provides it in regular payments, with a rate of interest, which can sometimes be quite high.			
Debit Card	This is a card that is linked to a bank account where you keep your money. A debit card allows you to spend your own money.			
Bank Account	A bank account is a safe place to store your money. It is looked after by a bank and you can use your money when you want. This will often be by using a debit card or chequebook linked to the account.			
Cheque	A cheque is a special piece of paper that you can write on to pay someone money from your bank account.			
Interest – this can mean a fee for borrowing money that increases the longer it is not paid back. Interest – this can also mean money you are given by your bank to encourage you to save money with them.

What Is a Mandala?



A mandala is a decorative picture which usually includes very complex designs.

The designs, which include a range of patterns and symbols, start from a central point, created in a cyclical image. The shapes are often geometric (decorated with lines and shapes) and recognisable.

What Is the Meaning of a Mandala?

A mandala can have special meanings for the person who has created it. The designs are a representation of the soul and therefore, the images used reflect the person's innermost hopes, dreams and sometimes, worries.



The Symbolism of the Soul

The mandala can be seen as a tool to help self-awareness. By expressing yourself through the design of a mandala, you are sharing yourself with those who view it. It might even reflect your view of reality.






Design Your Own Mandala






