






The witch sees the cow.








The witches see the cows.



#### How to make a mini onager



Stack 5 lolly sticks together, and rubber band the bundle at one end.

Stack 2 lolly sticks together, and wrap a rubber band at both ends








Wrap a rubber band around all of the lolly sticks to hold the catapult together.

Attach a spoon with rubber bands to the top lolly sticks to serve as a missile holder.
