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Latin **Golden Rules**


The English language shows meaning through word order, but Latin does it through changing the **endings** of words.

For example, we can tell who is 'in charge' of a verb by looking at its **ending**.


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'A' nouns: **Subject** and **object** in Latin



maga



vacca



videt


The witch sees the cow.
maga vaccam videt

The cow sees the witch.
vacca magam videt


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'A' nouns: **Subject** and **object** in Latin

The witches see the cows.
magae vaccas vident

The cows see the witches.
vaccae magas vident
