

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How to help your child read this book

This book gives your child extra practice in reading a book that includes sounds he or she has learnt at school.

Re-read each sentence or page to ensure your child understands what they are reading. Children's attention is focused on reading the words and they find it hard to focus on the information at the same time.

Don't make them struggle too much and praise them when they succeed. Do it all with patience and love!





But a wood is not just trees ...




Mushrooms grow well where it's wet.

Sticks can blow off trees when it is very windy.




Robins have red chests. They often sing from the trees.




In some woods, paths have been put high up between the trees.
