Key question: Can we create a code for living that would help the world?

Think about some codes for living that Christians and Humanists might try to follow – which of these were important? Were there any similarities and differences?

Look at the Ten Commandments (Exodus Chapter 20) and The Principles of Humanism: how are these similar to the answers you gave?

- I am the Lord your God: you shall have no other gods but me.
- You shall not make for yourself any idol.
- You shall not dishonour the name of the Lord your God.
- Remember the Sabbath and keep it holy.
- Honour your father and mother.
- You shall not commit murder.
- You shall not commit adultery.
- You shall not steal.
- You shall not be a false witness.
- You shall not covet anything which belongs to your neighbour.

Think about why people do good and bad things; remember the Bible's picture of people being made in God's image but also 'fallen'.
